



Meet Your Clients


Maggie is 87 years old and identifies as transgender and straight. She uses the pronouns "she" and "her." Maggie has some forgetfulness due to vascular dementia and receives some services. Maggie has a son who lives in another state.

Jim is 81 years old and identifies as a gay man and uses the pronouns "he" and "him." Jim's partner, who did most of the cooking and house maintenance, died of complications from Alzheimer's disease. He relies on a network of friends to check in on him.





The ACLU is tracking 461 anti-LGBTQ bills in the U.S.

- 54, Defense against Marriage Act
- 71, MN Marriage Amendment

Maggie, 1936

- 16, Christine Jorgensen receives first reassignment surgery in Europe
- 33, Stonewall
- 57, MN anti-trans discrimination law passed
- 58, AMA removes designation
- 63, Texas case rules against transwoman as widow

HIV and Aging



HIV and Aging Statistics

More than half of all people living with HIV are 50 or older


Older adults living with HIV show signs of aging on average 10 years earlier than the general population

35% of older adults are diagnosed later in the disease process

Early detection can prevent many complications related to long-term untreated HIV

HIV Stigma Amongst Older Adults

HIV stigma is a factor for anyone living with HIV, but is more likely to impact older adults

LGBTQ+ older adults may experience HIV stigma without living with HIV

Greater risk of isolation and loneliness

Impacts quality of life, self-image, and care-seeking behavior

More significant need to link older adults to supportive services to keep them engaged in care

2022 LGBTQ MN Aging Needs Assessment



Data Snapshot

Nearly **twice** as likely to be caregivers.

Less likely to have a caregiver.

Half as likely to have children.

More likely to live alone.

More likely to have completed a health-care directive.

Nearly **twice** as likely to volunteer.



Confidence in Receiving Sensitive Care

Do you feel that senior service providers would be sensitive to you if your sexual orientation and / or gender identity were known?





History Matters: Trauma Informed Care

50% of respondents report having personally experienced harassment or abuse due to their sexual orientation

53% of transgender respondents have personally experienced harassment or abuse due to their gender identity

75% know of someone who has experienced this due to either their sexual orientation or gender identity



Meet Your Clients

Today, **Maggie** experiences high-levels of anxiety whenever there is a new caregiver or home service who comes into her home, because she's afraid of how she'll be treated by them as a trans person. She has told a friend she might consider taking her own life if she starts to forget she has transitioned.

Jim's friends want him to attend a grief support group or join a men's shed because he loves building things. They are unsure how long he can live independently. Jim has not joined any groups or researched assisted living because he's worried what other participants or residents will think about him.



Support Groups Make a Difference

Jim is thrilled to discover a local LGBTQ Grief Group, cofacilitated by a member of the community.

Our Needs Assessment shows that older LGBTQ folks are generally comfortable receiving "mainstreamed" health services – except 66% prefer LGBTQ only support groups.







What Can I Do?



Staff Training

Train all staff, at all levels of the organization, on inclusive care regularly

- History of LGBTQ+ community
- Sexual Orientation
- Gender Identity
- Overviews of LGBTQ health (needs and risk factors)
- Rights of LGBTQ+ clients and patients
- Guidelines for providing inclusive care
- Cultural awareness and bias
- Communication strategies
- Profession-specific LGBTQ components



Training Can Make a Difference

When a new home care attendant arrives and introduces themselves with their pronouns, Maggie is put at ease. She has learned to look for signals of acceptance, and this small gesture allows Maggie to feel more comfortable in her own home.



Pronouns

Pronouns are how we refer to someone when we aren't using their name.

Pronouns *often* denote gender. Using someone's correct pronouns is a way to affirm their identity.

- Some pronouns are:
 - She/her/hers
 - He/him/his
 - They/them/their



Gender Affirmation

Transgender people sometimes change their name, pronouns, take hormones, and/or surgically alter their bodies...

... but none of these are *required* to be transgender.



Gender is less like this:





And more like this:



How do I know what pronouns someone uses?

You **can't** determine someone's pronouns by how they look or what their name is.

So, ask!

- "My name is Maren and I use she/her pronouns. What pronouns do you use?"
- Denotes you as a safe person
- Puts the power in the hands of the other person



Strategy:

Share your own pronouns even if you don't feel comfortable asking for someone else's.

Employee Policies

- Recruit from LGBTQ+ communities
- Review employee handbook for potential policy improvements
- Review employee benefits to ensure LGBTQ+ employees covered equally
- Include how welcome and supported LGBTQ+ employees feel in organization culture assessments

Your Clients Hit Road Bumps

Jim attends a birding workshop at his local senior center. He shares with the speaker that his now-deceased partner bought him a pair of binoculars for his birthday several years ago. The speaker asks what his wife's name was.

Will Jim ever return to the senior center??

Maggie meets a volunteer house helper at her front door, forgetting to put on her wig. The house helper greets Maggie with, "Good morning, sir."

Is this situation DOOMED???
